The #StPetePelicanScavengerHunt was created to be a fun way to celebrate our City bird, support local business, learn a little, and see a lot of art!

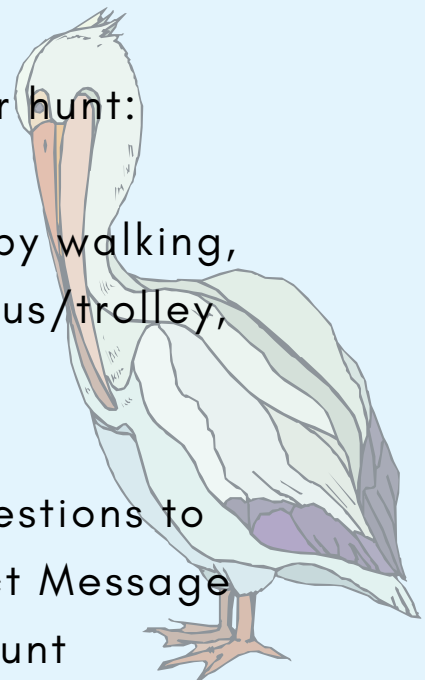
As you explore, please be safe and respectful of traffic, businesses, private property, wildlife and people.

All Pelicans must be documented with a photo and submitted via email or Instagram for confirmation in order to win. They can be found in any order, but finding some may depend on timing (access to the property or season), and may not be easy to capture - just do your best and have fun!

There are two ways complete the scavenger hunt:

- Find enough Pelicans to earn 50 points
- Find enough Pelicans to earn 30 points by walking, bicycling, skating, scooting, riding the bus/trolley, etc - NO CARS

# #StPetePelicanScavengerHunt

- In 1927 in an effort to create more unity among residents, the city of St Petersburg sponsored a contest in which citizens helped design its first flag featuring the pelican. The pelican has been on every flag design since and has been in the city's logo since the 1980s. On January 9, 2020 the City of St. Pete officially named the Brown Pelican the city bird. Find a city logo.
  - 2 PointsExtra point for finding each of these additional City pelicans:
  - Stormwater manhole - 1 Point
  - Recycle bin - 1 Point
  - Park sign (with a pelican) - 2 Points
  - Painting in City Hall - 7 Points
- The first settlers in Pinellas landed in Big Bayou in the 1850s, developing it into a fisherman's village. Early pioneers Abel Miranda and John Bethell operated a fish camp (what they called a "fish rancho") on Big Bayou where they sold fish from the bay and hosted clam bakes for the community. This pelican can be found at a restaurant on 6th Street S, in a historic old house reminiscent of simpler times in Big Bayou. Partners Brian Rose and Nick Brown are bringing fish camps back in style - serving classic Florida seafood with a modern twist. A place to revive a sense of community, just like St. Pete's early pioneers had intended.
  - 3 Points
- This pelican can be found Next door to the fish camp, gracing a business that offers design and build services including "Custom homes designed to meet the needs of today's sophisticated homeowners including flexible room options & live-work or multi-generational layouts. Incorporating the latest design philosophies, high-quality construction methods & user-friendly technology you'd expect in a modern well-crafted custom home."
  - 2 Points

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- This long time southside dive bar was formerly known as Don's Irish Pub and was rebranded in 2022. Its name is a "wink" and a nod to the new owners. They're a no-nonsense neighborhood dive bar who welcome all that enter to enjoy a game of pool, darts, karaoke, or chicken roulette. You'll have to get friendly with their amazing staff to find this pelican.

- 5 Points

- Located at the entrance of St. Pete's signature exPIERience, this origami-style pelican in brilliant red was created by Nathan Mabry of Los Angeles. The 10-foot-high sculpture has been fabricated from thick aluminum plate metal and coated with a satin painted finish.

- 2 Points

There are smaller red pelicans on display throughout the district , extra point for each one you find.

- \_\_\_ Points

- A flock of 3 pelicans soar across the top of this building which is home to a locally owned and operated full-service automotive repair and maintenance shop that opened their doors in 1979. While "imports" is part of their name, the experts at JB's have years of experience working with all makes and models of vehicles.

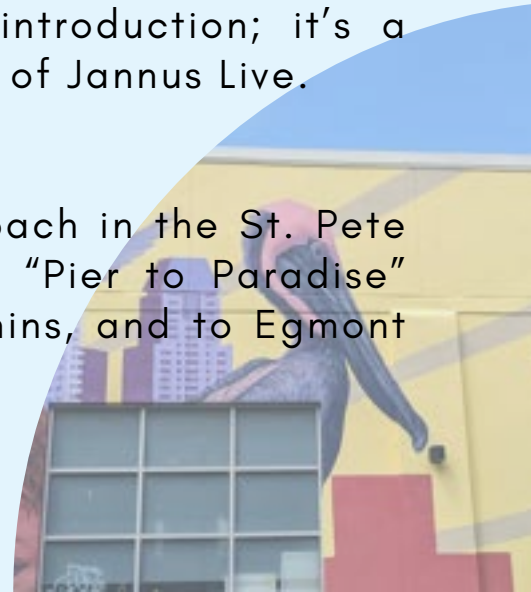
- 3 Points

- This "hole in the wall" Pub needs little introduction; it's a classic dive bar, sitting alongside the gates of Jannus Live.

- 2 Points

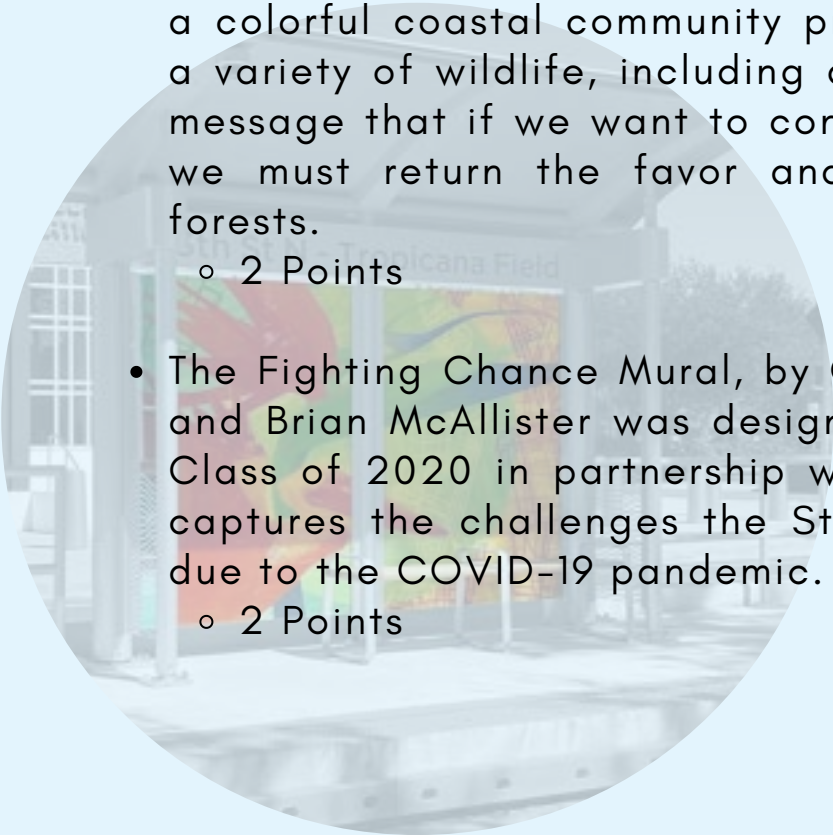
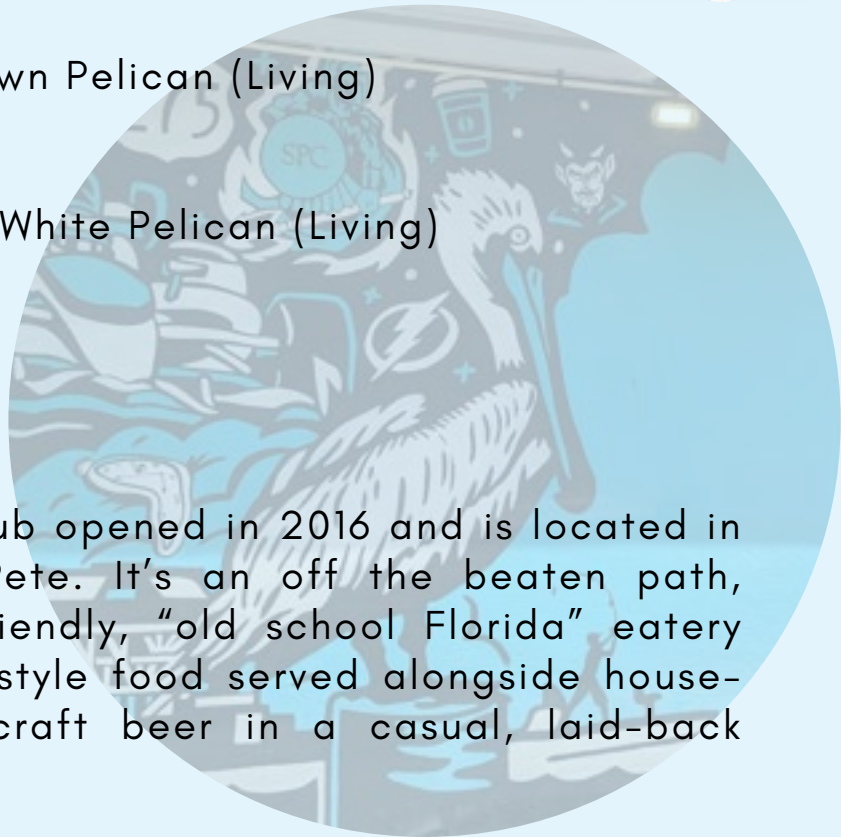
- Located behind Frescoes on the Pier approach in the St. Pete municipal marina, this company's motto is "Pier to Paradise" and they offer boat tours for sunset, dolphins, and to Egmont Key.

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- *Pelecanus occidentalis*, Brown Pelican (Living)
  - 5 Points
- *Pelecanus erythrorhynchos*, White Pelican (Living)
  - 10 Points
- Perch or fly like a pelican
  - 2 Points
- This restaurant and brew pub opened in 2016 and is located in the western part of St. Pete. It's an off the beaten path, family, pup and bicycle-friendly, "old school Florida" eatery featuring unique St. Louis-style food served alongside house-brewed and other local craft beer in a casual, laid-back setting.
  - 3 Points
- The Rooted in the Community mural on the USFSP graphic art and design building by Kenny Coil and Marc Berenguer depicts a colorful coastal community protected by mangroves hosting a variety of wildlife, including a white pelican. It conveys the message that if we want to continue to enjoy nature's beauty, we must return the favor and protect our mangroves and forests.
  - 2 Points
- The Fighting Chance Mural, by Gibbs High School's mural club and Brian McAllister was designed by the Leadership St. Pete Class of 2020 in partnership with the Morean Arts Center. It captures the challenges the St. Pete community encountered due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

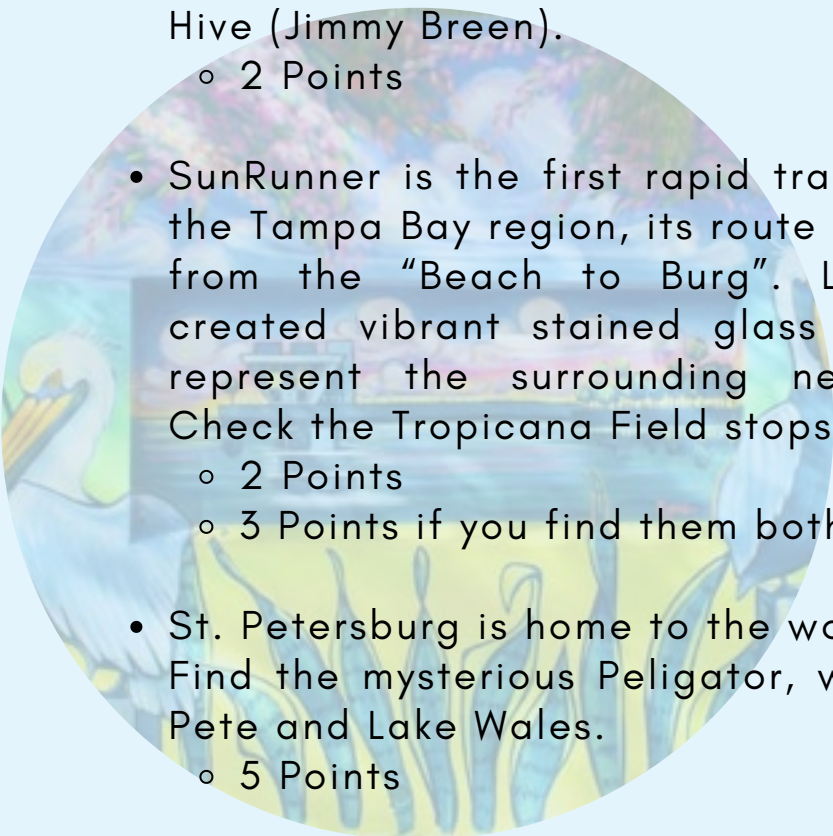
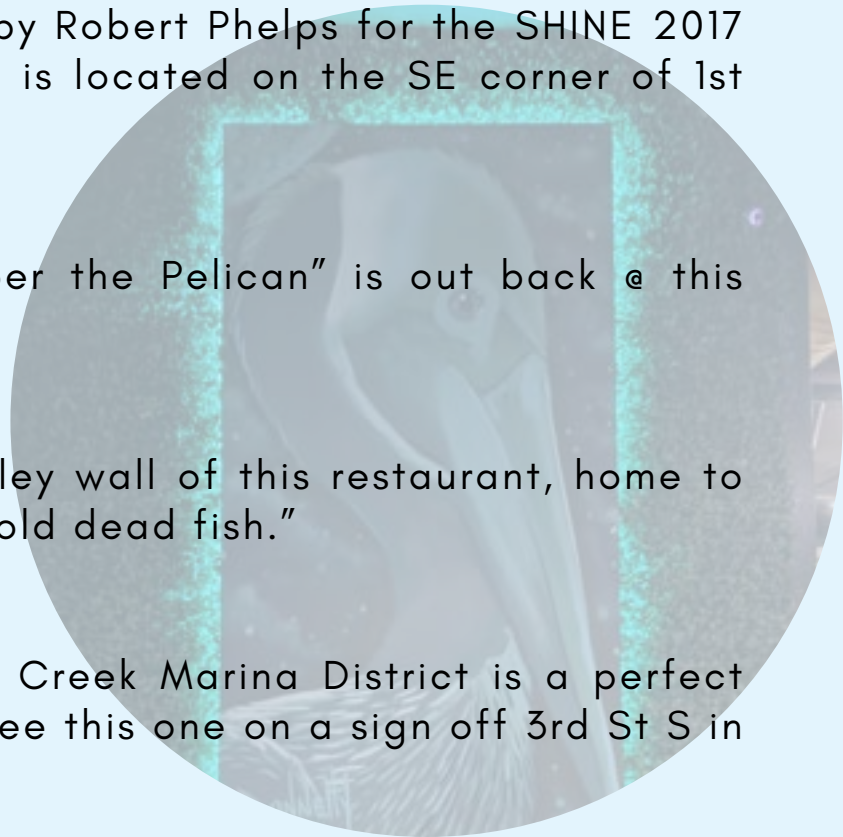
# #StPetePelicanScavengerHunt

- Originally founded in 1968 by Mary Smith Conover, this real estate firm is one of the few independent luxury brokerages left in the state of Florida today. Find Derek Donnelly's Birds of a Feather, Shine Together mural at their office in Historic Uptown.
  - 3 Points
- This spot serves pizza, pasta & subs prepped by a husband-wife duo in a warm, casual eatery with drinks and is open late every day. Their building is adorned by a Roger Kelso mural showcasing key moments and locations in St Petersburg's history; and wouldn't be complete without the City's signature bird.
  - 2 Points
- The only brewery in St. Pete whose logo is a pelican opened in 2014 and is known for favorite's such as: Put me in Kolsch, Grateful Stout, Orange Wheat Ale and Milo's IPA. They love supporting local artists almost as much as they love this bird.
  - 2 PointsExtra point for each of the pelicans by Alyssa Marie and Derek Donnelly.
  - \_\_\_ Points
- In a plaza off Gandy Blvd, this black owned smoke shop and hookah lounge has a pelican mural that welcomes you to St. Petersburg.
  - 3 Points
- Commissioned by the League of Women Voters of St. Pete, the nonpartisan and inclusive for all parties "Diversity in Democracy" mural was created by local artists John Gascot and James Hartzell with a focus on the LGBTQ community. Be sure to scan the "VOTED" stickers with your phone for voting resources, request a mail in ballot, or get info about voting in the LGBTQ community.
  - 2 Points



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- This pelican was designed by Robert Phelps for the SHINE 2017 Corner Canvas Project and is located on the SE corner of 1st Ave & 6th St S.
  - 2 Points
- Jenipher Chandley's "Skipper the Pelican" is out back @ this Bar.
  - 2 Points
- A pelican SHINEs on the alley wall of this restaurant, home to "tikis, tapas, billiards and cold dead fish."
  - 2 Points
- "Sailboat Row" or the Salt Creek Marina District is a perfect place for a pelican, you'll see this one on a sign off 3rd St S in Old Southeast.
  - 3 Points
- Established in 2015, this market sits at the base of Thrill Hill and has a pretty sweet mural summarizing St. Pete by Wax & Hive (Jimmy Breen).
  - 2 Points
- SunRunner is the first rapid transit, hybrid electric bus line in the Tampa Bay region, its route is a 10.3 mile loop with 16 stops from the "Beach to Burg". Local artist Catherine Woods created vibrant stained glass panels for each station that represent the surrounding neighborhoods and community. Check the Tropicana Field stops to see her renditions.
  - 2 Points
  - 3 Points if you find them both
- St. Petersburg is home to the world's largest shuffleboard club! Find the mysterious Peligator, who once traveled between St. Pete and Lake Wales.
  - 5 Points



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- This team was the first professional sports franchise in the area. Originally established in 1975, they won the NASL championship their inaugural year. After a hiatus the team resumed play in 2010 and in 2012, they again won the NASL Championship in front of a sold out crowd at Al Lang Stadium. Their mascot's since 2016 and 2020, Pete and Pinnie are among the most popular pelicans in St. Pete, take a pic at their home field.
  - 2 Points
  - 5 Points for a picture with Pete and Pinnie
- The Old Northeast Neighborhood is characterized by waterfront green space, brick streets and alleys, granite curbs, oak tree canopies, front porches and hexagon block sidewalks. Its amenities, proximity to downtown, parks and coherent sense of neighborhood make it one of the City's most desirable. These two pelicans are portrayed perched on either side of the City's beloved former inverted pyramid pier, in a mural at a private residence near 6th Ave and 3rd St. N.
  - 3 Points
- So much more than a market—established in 1993, it started as a coffee roasting company. Due to their success, they decided to expand adding a deli, bakery, meat counter, coffee bar, wine and cheese room and fresh produce—totaling 13,000 square feet of retail space. They are also known for charming and colorful frescos and decor that transport you to Italy. This pelican is found on their grounds and if you're small enough, might let you ride it.
